18 years ago Nel arrived in Wivenhoe from Holland via London, together with her now wife Angela, who hails from Clacton. The Essex open skies, the water and the relatively flat land make her feel very much at home. This feels even more so, as there are quite a lot of fellow Dutch people around, including now and then, some sailors visiting the club.

Why Wivenhoe? 'Just because it looked perfect on the map.' Close, but not too close, to a town, along a river, a railway straight into London and right between family-in-law in Clacton and Eight Ash Green. Two years later their son, Oliver, was born.

In London Nel had enjoyed rowing on the Thames and therefore was keen to try this out on the Colne. However, with the strong tide and no safety boats around she knew a racing skiff might be a bit edgy and in the end found a boat for sale via eBay – rowed by someone on the sea in Felixstowe, so that should be ok. *Sirius Drinking* (originally a club boat sponsored by Greene King, for a club where all boats were named after a star) was moved to Wivenhoe and the family joined the sailing club, getting quite a few remarks about a boat without a sail at a sailing club. The boat was however perfect for the Colne conditions and

has recently transferred to the ownership of a fellow sailing club member.

To feel part of the sailing club Nel felt it would help to get involved and was a member of the General Committee and Angela cleaned the hard for a while. Now Nel looks after the WSC *facebook* page.

Her father-in-law was a keen sailor in Clacton with a number of boats to match – so they gained a Topper, that Oliver has sailed happily, as well as a Wineglass a vintage fibreglass dinghy. Somehow they also acquired 2 kayaks, which meant that, for a while, sailing club correspondence was addressed to Nel 'the fleet' Mooy. To prepare they did a RYA course in Brightlingsea, after which on a short outing in the Wineglass, various ropes broke – vintage indeed!

Oliver joined the cadets and he was happy, so Angela and Nel tried the Wineglass again and something else broke and they lost their nerve - too much wind, too little wind, too cold! So they told themselves 'if we just got some more practice it would be all right!' Angela had been to Menorca sailing in her youth and her parents, now in maturity, wanted to go dinghy sailing, one more time and Menorca seemed the answer and it was! 'beautifully rigged and ready boats, safety boats, warm water, instruction and someone to catch your boat when you came in for lunch'.

Back in Wivenhoe – they tried again and ended on the other side of the river with a broken centre-board – 'we kept Rob busy!' With or without sailing, the river has given them lots of joy – rowing, kayaking, St. Nicholas arriving for the Dutch diaspora or

just walking along it. 'We are really lucky to live in such a perfect place' she says. And on the sailing front, this year is going to be different! 'We know we can sail, we have a fixed boat and no excuses — so watch out for (and probably avoid) us on the river!'

message from the Commodore:

Spring has caught me out again, one minute the weather is cold and miserable then out of nowhere the sun comes out, it starts to warm up, all the daffodils come out and I start panicking about the amount of work to be done before the boat goes back in the water. It's the same every year, I should be used to it by now.

Wivenhoe Sailing Club is fortunate in many ways but one thing that we are not blessed with is a large boat park. At this time of year both cruisers and dinghies have to be moved around the boat park, so that the Lifting Group can get the cruisers launched. Launching the cruisers is hard work, often made harder when dinghies that need to be moved are full to the gunwales with water, or the tyres on their trolleys are flat, or the launching trolleys are falling to pieces. So please will all of the dinghy owners make sure that your dinghies can be easily moved. Not only does lifting a boat full of water not do much good for people's backs, it doesn't do any favours to the dinghy either.

Anyway, enough of my moaning, something else that happens every year! But let me first reiterate my appreciation to all those who, in whatever way, helped with the 'hard working party' at the end of March – well done!

Now, after getting the boat ready, getting all the gear back on the boat, checking the mooring and checking a hundred and one other things, you begin to think that being a boat owner is nothing but bloody hard work. Eventually you get to have your first sail of the year and then you know why you do it, because there is nothing quite like it and so far, for me, it's been more than worth it every year. I hope you all have a great season and look forward to seeing you all out on the water.


members' meeting 19th March, 2017:

Vice Commodore's report:

Hello to all club members

By the time you read this, the clocks will have gone forward, spring will have sprung and we'll all be looking forward to a brand-new sailing season – hopefully enjoying the fruits of our winter labours! With these thoughts in mind, I'll bring you up to speed on what's been happening at the club recently and give you a brief summary of what you can expect over the coming weeks.

Firstly, I'd like to say a big thank-you to all those who turned out for the hard-working party on Saturday 25th March. Members readily tackled the tasks, from gardening and hard-cleaning to work-boat maintenance and cadet-boat rigging. Bernie ran a short demo

session on how to run the bar and Carole and her team of helpers very kindly kept everybody fed and watered. So, I'm delighted to say, the club is looking *spick and span* in time for the first race of the season.

On Friday 31st, we held a 'boat owners and sailors' meeting, attended by a great cross-section of our membership. We discussed various topics, ranging from encouraging less experienced members to get afloat, our young cadets and the ongoing cleaning of the club slipway (more on this later). The meeting generated lots of useful feed-back, and we plan to continue these conversations at the upcoming Sailing and General Committee meetings. Short talks were also given by our membership secretary Chris Wood, general committee member Robert de la Rue, cadet leader Steve Hart, commodore Bill Kippen, WivGigs rower Eryl Foulkes and myself.

So, now to what's on the horizon? Many of you will be itching to get on the water and it won't be long before you can. The race season will be kick-starting on Sunday 9th April (check the club website for full details) and cruiser lifting gets under way the following week, from Monday 10th April. If you haven't already booked in your lift slot, time is of the essence, so please do check our website for details of the lifting dates and times, so that the group can continue to plan ahead.

Unfortunately, we have made the decision to drop the evening races from our program this year due to poor attendance last season, however, if interest in them is regenerated, we will willingly review this, when planning ahead for next year's sailing calendar. In the meantime, there's still a very full sailing calendar to look forward to, with a fantastic selection of races and cruiser events, details of which can be all found on the club calendar. Please do support the races and cruiser events where you can. There's a lot of time and effort put into organising our club events and it's hugely rewarding when they are well attended by our membership.

For those with spare time this summer, we are also looking for volunteers to act as 'Officer of the day' for some of our races. Club member Ray Hall has kindly offered his services to show future volunteers the *ins and outs*, so if you'd like to see what's involved,

please feel free to contact myself or our commodore, Bill. We would also welcome any help our members are able to give for the ongoing maintenance of our Viking workboat. It is currently under the care of Richard Mosek and Peter Goldsmith, who are doing a fine job of preparing her for the new season but, as they say many hands make light work! As I'm sure you're all aware, our club slipway is also vitally important to the activities of the club but unfortunately, in more recent times, it has become extremely muddy, which has made it difficult – not to mention dangerous – to launch our boats. While this is partly due to some unreliable equipment, it is also down to a lack of volunteers to operate the said I'm pleased to say, we have equipment. solved half of this problem, by acquiring a new pump, which is much easier to handle, however we are still on the look-out for club members, who would be willing to spare a few hours of their time. Club member John Bampton has kindly offered to pass on his experience to help new volunteers to carry out this task more easily, so again, if you think you may be able to offer some time, please do get in touch with myself or Bill.

Finally, I would like to announce that club member Toby Roberts has decided to stand down from looking after the dinghy park after four years of commitment. I would like to extend my thanks to Toby for all the work he's put in over this time and welcome Mike Mitchell, who will be taking on the role from next month. One of his first jobs will be to dispose of the dinghies and canoes, that have been abandoned by arranging a blind auction — so if you haven't already paid for your storage fees and displayed your tag, please make sure you do so soon.

Hunter 19 – Black Hunter.

As part of the many facilities that the club has to offer we are fortunate in having a small cruiser available for members to use, without charge! This small black hulled cruiser is currently kept on a mooring opposite the club. This is easily accessible by dinghy from the hard or pontoons. She was not used very much last year and the sailing committee has discussed various ways of trying to encourage her use. She is ideal for people without their own boat or who have a dinghy and want to gain experience in a slightly larger boat without the costs of buying their own. Until now, we have deliberately kept her very simple, on the basis that the less there is onboard, the less there is to go wrong. She has good sails, 2 anchors and warps, paddles and depth sounding pole and due to her small fin keel, sails remarkably well. Please do not be put off by the keel, as she only draws 3ft and is easy to wriggle off the mud when you go aground.

Wivenhoe Sailing Club Annual Report 2016

(Including the year up to December 2016 and the prospects for 2017) Presented by the officers of the club at the 91st AGM on 3rd March 2017.

THE COMMODORE'S REPORT ON THE YEAR.

I was tempted to start my yearly report by saying that if you all came to the club on Friday nights a couple of times a month then you would all know what was going on, and we could be back at the bar in about five minutes, but I suppose that would be a bit of a cop out.

'The club was formed for the encouragement of sailing'. It says so in our constitution and everything we do is to help us to achieve our stated objective.

How did we do last year? On the whole, pretty good. People went sailing. People went rowing and canoeing, which is like sailing but without the sail, so we'll claim them as part of our success. The Cadet Section was very active. We have got a group of really keen youngsters, who because of this club have been encouraged to have a go at messing about in boats.

We had three club cruises in company last summer which were fairly well supported and hopefully those who took part had a good time. We re-introduced an Around The Gunfleet race, but this time as a sort of team race. It included crews from Wivgigs, WCKC, ACBOA and Wivenhoe Sailing Club. The intention was to help to create closer ties between the local rowing, canoeing and sailing organisations, as well as to have a good thrash around the Gunfleet. Those who took part had a great time and we intend to have another go in June, when, hopefully, it will prove to be even bigger and better. The W.O.D.s raced in Pyefleet Week and a couple of our intrepid dinghy sailors competed at Aldeburgh Classics weekend.

The lifting group continue to perform well beyond the call of duty. A record number of cruisers have been brought ashore for the winter.

We have had a full social calendar with the Annual Dinner, the Row and Ramble, Burns Night and the Variety Show to name just some of the highlights.

Could we do better? Well yes, but that's up to you. I'm very hopeful for next season. I have always believed that people join sailing clubs because they want to get out on the water and participate in club activities. Yacht clubs are for those who mistakenly think that there is some kind of kudos in just being a member.

To achieve our objective we also have to do quite a lot of stuff that's not quite so interesting, such as maintaining the buildings, the safety boats, the workboat, and various bits of equipment. This year the exterior of the club house has been re-painted, a lot of refurbishment has been completed on the hut on the old hard, but there is still a bit of work outstanding for next year. The five year electrical test had to be done which required a bit of expenditure to get everything up to scratch. Generally I think we are maintaining the infrastructure faster than it's decaying but obviously it's a never ending process and there's always more to do.

We've managed to pay all the bills and the club remains financially secure. We have been able to keep the membership fees and other charges to members the same as they were for 2016.

To achieve all of this takes a lot of work by a lot of people and I would like to thank all the members of the various committees, the cadet leaders and helpers, everyone who has helped with running the club, organised and helped with club events and helped to maintain the buildings and club equipment. Without you there would be no sailing club.

I am still convinced that Wivenhoe Sailing Club is, probably, the best sailing club in the world, but to remain the best the club needs the support of every member. So please be an active member, support club events, and help out when and where you can.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT ON 2016 ACCOUNTS

Despite reporting a loss in 2016, the Club remains in strong financial health. Overall, expenditure exceeded income by £1,665 this year, although in operating (cash) terms we had a surplus of £931. This compares with a cash surplus of £15,063 in 2015.

In income terms, we saw a reduction of £3,074 (4%). There is no single explanation for this: the single biggest reduction is in clubhouse event income, followed by dinghy storage, members' subscriptions and cadet fund income. Lettings (now split to indicate members' lettings and external bookings) were also down slightly, but our other key source of commercial revenue (bar income) was flat year-on-year.

A far larger part of the explanation of the changing net position was increased costs in the year, up £11,059 (18%). The increases were mainly in three areas: almost £7,000 more expenditure on repairs and renewals, more than £5,000 invested in the refurbishment of the Old Hard and around £1,500 additional expenditure on boats and engines. While the increase in repairs and renewals is particularly significant, I expressed concern last year that we were under-spending on maintenance; this year we have seen a necessary adjustment. Three items – external painting, replacing our coolers and electrical works (including some remedial activities) – account for more than half of the total on this line. If we average the repair/renewal costs for the past two years, it is historically comparable with previous years (less than either 2014 or 2012, for example).

Bearing in mind these costs – and in particular one-off expenses relating to the Old Hard – it is positive that we managed to increase our cash in the course of year, albeit by a small amount. With cash assets of around £77,000, more than our total expenditure in the course of the year, we remain in a secure position. Taking into account 10% increases in subscriptions and fees over the last two years, the General Committee took the decision to implement a one-off freeze these for 2017. However, we anticipate further inflationary pressures in the course of the year, so members should expect increases in 2018.

As I sign off as Treasurer, I would again like to thank those whose accurate record-keeping and careful stewardship of funds keeps the Club in a strong position, including the Rear Commodores, Sailing Committee, Lifting Group and Cadet leaders. I would also like to wish my successors all the best in the role.

nature walk 2017:

Our annual nature walk this year took place on Sunday 12th March. The day dawned and it was almost perfect, warm, with the sun gently rising over the mud flats, the sky bright and little or no wind. The earlier 09.15 start seems to have discouraged a few members but a great group of 14 set off expectantly!

The run of southerly winds recently has encouraged some of our winter visitors to start moving north to their breeding grounds so no ticks were recorded for brent geese, lapwing, turnstone or widgeon! (First time ever, on the annual walk.) Some were obviously still present further down river in the estuary. Conversely, two summer arrivals were seen and ticked, being chiff-chaff and garden warbler.

Green woodpeckers were seen and heard a plenty in flight, on branches and on the ground. Such a beautiful bird! We had a lovely sighting of a pair of goosander in Marriages' bite, unusual as they are normally present on freshwater not salt! Excellent

views of yellowhammer, reed bunting and chiff-chaff were enjoyed.

A swarm of bees were feasting on/collecting the pollen from the exquisite flowering 'pussy willow' above our heads on the old railway footpath. We were to enjoy the call and sight of a chiff-chaff as it arrived and flitted amongst the bees and branches of the small 'goat's beard' willow tree. We had superb views of it. Blue tits, great tits, long-tailed tits and a great spotted woodpecker were seen as we followed the paths across the fields and along the wooded lane.

On our arrival back at the clubhouse, delicious veg. and beef chilli was ready for us and the bar open. Huge thanks to Myrna, Midge and Lars. Roy and Val also served drinks with style.



The much maligned Herring Gull:

Despite their name, they don't seem that fond of herring! It is one large gull, having a body length of 26in (66cm) and a wing-span of just over 5ft (155cm)! Some birds are slightly smaller.

Herring gulls are probably the best known of all the gulls and most are permanent residents, though we do have winter visitors from Scandinavia and Russia. These gulls have a very varied diet including fish, crustaceans, dead animals and some plants – true scavengers. They love shelled prey and are often observed dropping them from a height, in order to

break the shell. These gulls can be identified by their grey back and upper wings and white head and under-parts. The wings have black tips with white spots known as mirrows. The bill is yellow with a red spot on the end of the lower mandible and around the eye is a ring of bare yellow skin. Their legs are pink (flesh coloured) at all stages of life. Young birds are mainly speckled brown with darker streaks and at this stage have dark bills and eyes. Only after 4 years of slow change do they get adult plumage.

Herring gull numbers have been harmed in recent years, possibly by declines in fish populations and competition. Also human activity on the coast has deprived these birds of their natural habitat and ways. natural behaviour there irritates – their nesting habitats, constant calling, young squeaking, their droppings, scavenging ways etc. So these gulls have moved inland, firstly to land-fill sites, after burning of waste there was banned by legislation and then to streets and gardens in towns and cities, due to street lights allowing twenty-four hour foraging. Here they find discarded food in streets, in easy to tear plastic bags and that left out for other birds. The lack of predators and availability of warm roof tops, with ideal nesting places, have caused their numbers to soar. Again their noise, droppings and stealing of people's food, have made them very unpopular. They are just adapting and learning to survive!

It is interesting to note that, although they flock, these particular gulls keep physical contact between individuals to a minimum. Except when breeding, each gull attempts constantly to keep a 'safe distance' from each other but they are very social ie. if one gull finds food and decides there is more than it alone can eat, it calls others of the flock to come and share it! These birds help each other out. Also they have been seen using bread as bait to catch goldfish! Clever birds! They even wash some foods before eating.

Since 2009 – on the <u>red</u> list of birds (means there is concern over this bird). It was not until the 1990's that the first herring gulls nested in Essex. Could write a book on gulls – but I won't! Tim Denham [go on, Ed.]

ENJOYING YOURSELF!


NB there will be easy-to-follow instructions for those with poor memories!
